Toronto Arts Foundation and RBC Foundation have begun their second partnership year for the innovative RBC Newcomer Artist Spotlight Program, building on the potential of newcomer artists and removing the barriers they face when it comes to arts access. The RBC Newcomer Artist Spotlight is designed to connect and inspire newcomer artists who are Toronto's new generation of cultural leaders and innovators.

"RBC believes that the arts encourages a culture of creativity and innovation, and helps foster diversity and inclusion in our communities," said Rebecca Louzado, Director, Community and Cultural Marketing, RBC. "We are so proud to have been able to partner with the Toronto Arts Foundation and provide newcomers with the funding to pursue their artistic endeavours while building their lives in Canada."

The RBC Newcomer Artist Spotlight features three components: the RBC Arts Access Fund, the Mentorship Program and the RBC Let's Talk Art workshop series. The RBC Arts Access Fund consists of micro awards of up to \$1,500 for newcomer artists looking to jump-start their community-engaged arts projects. These awards will be tied to actual project needs, ranging from art supplies to space rental for an event. The first round of RBC Arts Access Fund recipients will be announced in early 2017.

STAFF SPOTLIGHT: TANYA OLEKSUIK WINS NASA GLOBAL COMPETITION

We recently sat down with Tanya Oleksuik, Communications Manager at East End Arts, to find out how she uses her creative side to court learning and align arts advocacy with other passions.

TAF: You identify as a proud proponent of the STEM to STEAM movement. Why is 2017 a critical moment in time to integrate arts and design into the STEM educational curriculum?

TO: Arts and design have always been components of each of the STEM elements, and the STEAM movement is an opportunity to recognize and celebrate the creative processes that play an integral role in the sciences, engineering, and technology. STEAM can encourage more cross collaboration, and opens people up to exploring things in new ways.

TAF: What are you doing to ensure that

art is included in the equation? What can others do?

TO: I find ways to link ideas, concepts, projects, and people together, and look for opportunities for collaboration. I talk about STEAM a lot to people, and like to introduce the idea to those in STEM fields who may not have heard the term used before. I encourage people to invite artists to the table, bring artists into their conversations and planning processes, and to identify the areas where this collaboration already exists in their work. Most people understand the natural connection right away. You see the light bulb go off, they get it, and they see the value and importance of having art in the equation.

TAF: How do you go about marrying your interest in astronomy with the arts?

TO: This past spring, I participated in the 2016 NASA International Space Challenge. It brought together a diverse group of people with varying STEAM skills to develop creative solutions to NASA challenges. During the 48-hour hackaton in Toronto, I worked with a team to create Kid On The Moon, an interactive app for children to inspire the next generation of space explorers. My personal passions for astronomy, technology, and the arts all collided to contribute to this project. We won NASA's global competition for "Most Inspirational" project.

TAF: The NASA Space Apps challenge brings together engineers, artists, coders, storytellers and everyone in between. What do you think this type of event says about the scope of possibilities for those who wish to pursue the arts?

TO: The arts are for everyone. People are multi-dimensional, and we should celebrate and encourage people to enjoy a wide array of interests and learn a variety of skills. Wherever your passions lie, pursue and combine them. Experiment. Learn new things. Don't look for a roadmap, create your own. Use new technologies as tools to imagine new ways to observe, address, and solve challenges. Hackatons are a perfect example of how putting together groups of people with different backgrounds, skills, experiences, and styles can result in unique and creative solutions to challenges that may not have been realized without collaboration.



Neighbourhood Arts Network

Neighbourhood Arts Network is thrilled to announce the return of our Newcomer Artist Spotlight Program! It will be launched for the second year with the return of **RBC** Arts Access Fund. These micro-awards of up to \$1,500 are given to newcomer artists to jumpstart their arts-based projects in local communities, or to aid in their professional development so that they can better strive to succeed in Toronto's diverse creative landscape.

Neighbourhood Arts Network remains dedicated to being responsive and supportive to the newcomer experience and providing a platform to discuss the complexities and challenges that emerge with moving to a new country. In the past, these awards ranged from the production of a short documentary that collages the narratives of migrant women to an exploration of trans-national narratives through the creation of recycled art.

In early 2017, RBC Arts Access Fund will be followed by a set of Let's Talk Art workshops, providing free professional development opportunities for newcomer artists and led by acclaimed professional artists, art leaders and creative businesses.

Finally, we will be launching an exciting new partnership with Toronto Arts

RBC Arts Access Fund recipients focused on developing their entrepreneurial skills in partnership with Work In Culture.
